

Highlights of the week:

In maths this week, Earle class have been turning their attention to money! We spoke about how important it is to learn about money, and why we need know about it. We began our topic by looking at the different notes and coins and I was very impressed to see that the children could all identify the different coins and notes. One of our favourite money tasks this week was when we became money counters! Miss Williamson and Mrs Hannah had been collecting lots of money but they forgot how much they had! Each clean-up crew had a big pile of coins and notes and had to find a way of counting all the money. We then added the money up to find a grand total of £421! As well as adding money, we have also been working out how we give change.

In literacy this week, we have been busy writing our hot task! We had to imagine we were another object from our class that went missing! We have also been looking at poetry.
